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COVID-19 Administrative Update

Message from the Executive Director to Administrative Staff

Hi All

Thank you all for giving your best to continue serving the Community through this unprecedented time – you truly reflect Tseshaht spirit. I want to provide an update for our effort to minimize the impact of the

COVID-19 pandemic. Our effort has given the EOC reason to review administration's position on a go-forward basis. As a result of the review, administration has been given approval to return to regular operations and will return to regular office hours for staff only beginning Tuesday, September 8th. The building will remain closed to public until the COVID-19 pandemic presents less risk.

We continue to follow the direction of the EOC and B.C.'s Public Health Officer and make decisions for the workplace based on this direction. If transmission of COVID-19 increases, we may reintroduce restrictive measures such as pausing of programs and services etc. We also continue to assess risk and identify specific conditions where potential exposure may occur. Based on these assessments, we continue to implement controls to prevent exposure to COVID-19 including the following:

- Administration building remains closed to public
- Public buildings such as Maht Mahs (including kitchen), Youth Center, Cultural Center and Family Center remain closed
- Continue physical distancing measures such as limiting the number of people in washrooms, coffee room and Great room
- Providing additional hand sanitizing stations
- Continue cleaning protocol for common areas and high touch surfaces
- Continue limiting all non-essential travel in and out of the community including staff business travel

Staff that have one symptom of COVID-19 (fever, cough or difficulty breathing), or even mild symptoms, should stay home to avoid spreading illness to others

Thank you all for your continued effort as we move cautiously forward through uncharted waters – stay safe!

COVID-19 OFFICE CLOSURE

Tseshaht Administration Office continues to be closed at this time to all members of the public.

Electors are reminded that mail in nominations must be received by the Electoral Officer no later than the close of the nomination meeting, Monday September 14, 2020 at 7:00 pm.

NOMINATION MEETING:

DUE TO COVID-19 CONCERNS, the Nomination Meeting will be conducted at the Administration Building in a drive-by fashion, similar to fish distribution, on Monday September 14, 2020 starting at 5:00 PM. The Nomination Meeting will be open for a minimum of 2 hours, continuing until the line of nominators ends.

Nominations can be made by driving up to the front entrance of the Administration Building and submitting a completed mail in nomination form to the Electoral Officer (both sides). If you don't have a form you may collect a blank form from staff at the entrance to the parking lot.

The Electoral Officer (or Deputy EO) will review nomination forms as they are submitted for completeness and update the list of nominees as necessary.

Members who wish to witness the meeting may do so by standing in one of the clearly defined witness areas located near the front entrance, following strict physical distancing and sanitization protocol. ALL witnesses MUST wear a mask.

Laying the Somass Hall to Rest

For over 4 generations, "The Hall", as it was fondly known, was the heart beat for everyone who visited the Tseshaht territory. Weddings, lahal, potlatches, band events, haahuupayak graduation ceremonies, treaty meetings, dance practices, youth groups and much more were constant events.

Over the past few months, exterminators have been working at reducing the rodent population to a very small number and we have reached a point where risk of rodents fleeing to nearby buildings is very minimal.

Pamphlets will be given out to attendees as well we will send extra copies in the next newsletter.

Planning strategies for COVID, visiting homes for ideas on brushings and cleansings, as well as recalling past events have now been completed.

COVID will allow only Tseshaht members to witness this event. There will be a live stream on Facebook for all others.

Parking attendants will help with parking.

"Greeters" will remind attendees of hand sanitation, showing which direction to follow and where your family members should stand. Chairs will be available for elders.

We will also have a person writing down all the names of people attending, in order to document attendance as well as COVID tracing should we have concern of an outbreak.

Signs will show where the coffee is served on trays (by coffee servers only)

Brushers will start brushing at approximately 6:30 am.

Language Team Update


Language Strategy was adopted by community March 2020.

- We had 5 Tseshaht learners attending an online language intensive course offered by Adam Werle, this opportunity was promoted at our online class.
- Our last project for FirstVoices 2019-2020 posted approximately 1800 sound files of words and phrases from the t'aat'aaqsapa dictionary. Check out FirstVoices.com to see the additions we have been making to our archive.
- Grant, Data Tech, was interviewed by Rising Voices they are doing short series on indigenous from Latin America they interviewed group looking at us for ideas, they are linking up indigenous groups for learning from each other using our program and projects as an example
- Dawn, Language Coordinator sat on the a committee with the Canadian Heritage to review language funding proposals for communities outside of B.C..
- We added a new team member Jocelyn Dick as our Data Tech/Archive trainee.
- We were successful with all of our funding applications this year and have received funding from FirstVoices, First Peoples Cultural Council – B.C. Language Initiative, First Peoples Cultural Council – Indigenous Language Grant (previously Aboriginal Language Initiative) to operate our program this year.
- Online language classes over the summer were held every Thursday at 1:00pm. This class will be held Fridays at 12:00 starting September 11th.
- Created short videos as learning resources posted on our Facebook page and Youtube page. Most recently weather, greetings, and going for a walk videos.
- Created signage for at the dam and around the community.
- Working on a stop sign project to have signage on our roads in our language designed and installed
- Tseshaht language program is supporting its own Mentor-Apprentice team Kathaleen Good and Angie Joe, who have a unique opportunity where a language speaker and learner are living together so can safely participate in a MA program. They have completed 40 hours so far.
- Currently Recording with Willard Gallic and Lena Ross, working with Willard over the phone and internet because of Covid restrictions.
- This year's FirstVoices project will see an addition 1000 words and phrases along with audio from a first words document the team is currently reviewing the archive to cross reference.
- The whole team has been involved in FirstVoices training webinars for the month of September.



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Most people know about Crime Stoppers:

"If you have information about this, or any other Crime, call 1-800-222-TIPS"

"We want your information, not your name. Call 1-800-222-TIPS"

When you think of Crime Stoppers, you might think about T.V. shows like "Cops" and "America's Most Wanted", but Crime Stoppers is Canadian too. Crime Stoppers is an anonymous way for people to report information about crimes. While Crime Stoppers is not the police, they do work closely with police forces all over Canada.

Healthy Communities have to have ways to support victims of crimes. The first step in supporting victims is reporting the crime. Reporting the crimes doesn't necessarily mean 'putting bad guys in jail'. Reporting crime is the first step in making sure the culprit does not create any more victims.

Reporting crime in small or isolated communities can be very challenging. "What if he finds out I called it in?"

"Will I be safe?"

"Will everyone get mad at me?"

All legitimate concerns if the culprit is your spouse, your sibling, your parent, your neighbor, your father's best friend – well you get the idea. So how can you "rat" these people out and why would you?

The reality is that you aren't "ratting" anyone out. You are doing your part to keep your community safe and healthy. You are supporting victims and you are stopping people from creating more victims and you can do your part and stay anonymous by calling Crime Stoppers.





Tseshaht Emergency Operations Centre Report

As you are probably aware from media reports, medical advisors say that BC is either in, or at least starting, the anticipated second wave of the COVID pandemic. British Columbia's daily new infection rates are higher now than at any time since the pandemic started. Vancouver Island, thankfully, is still low in infections although Vancouver Island has had five new infections since last Saturday.



Central Vancouver Island (which includes Port Alberni) has had 49 cases since the pandemic started. Northern Vancouver Island has had 64 cases since the pandemic started and Southern Vancouver Island has had 65 cases since the pandemic started. As mentioned online, there is a confirmed case on reserve at Gold River. There is also an Ahousaht member who has tested positive but who lives in the Lower Mainland. Squamish First Nation is reported to currently have 31 cases in their outbreak. Alert Bay had 26 cases earlier this year but they have all resolved. Several other First Nations in BC have had members test positive and, in some cases, have lost members to COVID. Therefore, continued precautions are necessary. We are NOT immune.

It will be flu season soon and this has the potential to be very dangerous when combined with the COVID outbreak. We encourage everyone and at least those who is over 50 or who has underlying health problems or who is under 5 to get a flu shot. The flu vaccinations should be available sometime in early October and will be done through appointments with the nurse. Infant vaccinations, shingles vaccinations and adult pneumonia vaccinations continue but are done through appointments with the nurse. Phone the NTC nursing team at 250-724-5757 to set up an appointment with the nurse who comes to Tseshaht for youth vaccinations, adult shingles vaccination or pneumonia vaccination. Wait for an announcement for the flu vaccine.

Because we are now in, or entering, the second wave of COVID, the Emergency Operations Centre will begin distributing what supplies we have to elders next week. This will include cleaning supplies and masks. Priority to elders and the medically fragile.

I had a long meeting with the principle of Haahuupayak and am very happy with the school's efforts to keep the students safe. The school is doing more than the Chief Medical Officer of BC set out in her memo for opening schools.

At this point Tseshaht playgrounds and the Dam remain open, however, that is always subject to review if the infections continue to rise on Vancouver Island. At this time the Tseshaht offices are open to staff. Members must make an appointment.
