Re: FUNDING APPROVAL TO REPLACE THE FORMER SOMASS HALL

Today cišaa?ath (Tseshaht) First Nation is proud to announce that we have been approved for a \$3.4 million grant to build a new community hall to replace the former Somass Hall. This opportunity has been made possible through the Investing in Canada Infrastructure Program (ICIP) - Community, Culture and Recreation Program (CCR) from the Province of British Columbia and the Government of Canada. The grant will cover up to 75% of the project costs and Tseshaht is proud to support the remaining 25%.

"Tseshaht First Nation thank the Government of Canada and the Province of British Columbia for supporting our community with this very important infrastructure investment to build a new community facility to replace the old Somass Hall that had been previously deemed unsafe for use and deconstructed. Our Nation is experiencing the compounding impacts of the COVID-19 pandemic and the difficult work we must undertake with respect to the Alberni Indian Residential School (AIRS). This investment is a welcome sign of hope when the need is at an all-time high for children, youth, elders, community members, residential school survivors, and many others. A new Somass Hall is a great investment that supports Tseshaht and Nuu-chahnulth communities; and has broader positive economic impacts for the City of Port Alberni and our entire region. We thank the Province of BC and Government of Canada for this substantial investment into our Nation. We also want to thank the team at Urban Systems, Nuu-chah-nulth Tribal Council, Iredale Architecture, and all past/present Tseshaht staff and Council who helped make our application a reality.


member. My goal is to ensure that I can support our Nation by delivering the best possible services to community members. I look forward to hearing from community and supporting anywhere, in any

The campfire prohibition does not apply to cooking stoves that use gas, propane or briquettes, or portable campfire devices that use briquettes, liquid or gaseous fuel, provided they are CSA or ULC approved, and the height of the flame is less than 15 centimetres.

Category 2 and 3 fires were prohibited as of July 15, 2022 – this includes backyard and industrial burning. All burning prohibitions will be in place until October 28, 2022, or until rescinded.



Explore Indigenous language through this unique certificate program. You'll draw on local Indigenous knowledge systems, ways of knowing, and protocols through experiential and land-based learning to explore the values and beliefs encoded in Indigenous language. This cohort based program will help you to unearth the understanding of how language forms the foundation of all Indigenous relationships.

These courses are offered in a digital scheduled format where students participate in a digital classroom, using a video conferencing system, as well as completing some independent work. Students will be required to come together in person 2-3 times per semester. Students, instructors and language speakers will meet at specified times each week. Computer and internet required.
