Re: Tseshaht First Nation Mourns the Passing of BC's Former Premier, John Horgan

Earlier today, Tseshaht First Nation was informed of the passing of BC's Former Premier and former leader of the BC New Democratic Party (NDP), John Horgan. On behalf of our ḥawiiḥ, Elected Chief and Council, Elders and all 1,300+ Tseshaht members we send our thoughts, prayers, condolences and loving energy to his wife, Ellie, two sons as well as his extended family, friends, and colleagues.

John's work directly impacted Tseshaht in several ways while he was Premier of BC, helping push for the Declaration and Rights of Indigenous Peoples Act, supporting the sharing of BC Gaming Revenues to BC First Nations and our successes at the BC-Tseshaht negotiating table, leading to two agreements totaling over \$21 million.

A statement issued by current BC Premier, David Eby, states, "John loved this province and its people. He sought to address injustice wherever he saw it – using his time in office to help build a better, stronger British Columbia for everyone. Eby went on to say, "His many accomplishments as Premier will be felt for years and generations to come. His achievements are too numerous to mention, but he was a consequential Premier at a critical time in our history. He encouraged all of us to strive to be our better selves."
